Host has particular resonance throughout Ktaqmkuk, Nitassinan and Nunatsiavut (Newfoundland and Labrador). For centuries, this place has reckoned with cultural and environmental changes wrought by colonization, and devastating losses of species caribou and cod—closely tied to human livelihood and culture. An emerging tourism industry, promoting warmth and authenticity in a pristine environment, often overshadows the realities of ongoing resource extraction. Throughout their ancestral territories, Indigenous communities here continue to advance strategies of cultural resilience, sovereignty and land stewardship. These conversations are joined by generations of newcomers, navigating complex geopolitical forces and personal experiences of separation and belonging.

The 2023 Bonavista Biennale draws on these specificities, while also connecting to parallel conversations across Canada and beyond. At its core, *Host* is an invitation—for artists, community members and visitors—to evaluate our relationships and shared responsibilities to the lands and waters we settle, navigate and occupy. It is an opportunity to ask questions and make acquaintances, amplified through creative exchanges on common ground.
